

to explore personal desires and passions


while maintaining morality.

Is the District Deputy Grand Master automatically a Member of each Lodge in the District during his term of office?




The District Deputy Grand Master is authorized to preside, and only those with this authority are presented, received under the wands, accorded the Grand Honours and given the gavel.

Each Lodge in the District is required to send a copy of every Summons to the District Deputy; however he is not a Member of every Lodge in the District, and is certainly not entitled to vote or ballot. (See the Book of Constitution Sec. 96, 239 and 344).

<u>Book of Constitution-Sec. 96-The District Deputy Grand Master shall have authority, unless the Grand Master or the Deputy Grand Master be present, to preside at any Lodge Meeting within his District and to direct the business thereof during his visit thereto.</u>

<u>Book of Constitution</u>-Sec. 239-The Master shall cause the Secretary to send a copy of every Summons to the Members of the Lodge, the District Deputy Grand Master of the District in which the Lodge is situated, the Grand Secretary and the Grand Master.

Book of Constitution-Sec. 344-All Members of the Lodge present when the Ballot is taken must Ballot.







PETERBOROUGH DISTRICT EDUCATION AND ENLIGHTENMENT R.W. Bro. Bob Keay, Education Chairman

R.W. Bro. Bob Keay, as this year's District Education Chairman, will include a short piece of Masonic Education in each month's issue of *The Beacon: Lighting the Way !!!* newsletter. As the District Education Chair I will try and bring some education to *The Beacon: Lighting the Way !!!* each month that is informative, but not tedious to read.

THE KIRKWALL SCROLL

On the west wall of the temple of Lodge Kirkwall Kilwinning No. 38 in Orkney hangs one of the oldest and most important Masonic artifacts in the world. Known as The Kirkwall Scroll, it is made of three pieces of strong linen (some suggest sailcloth) sewn together and hand-painted throughout.

The complete hanging cloth is eighteen feet six inches long and five feet six inches wide. It consists of a centre strip that contains around one hundred Masonic symbols, and two outer strips that appear to be maps. The two outside strips appear to have come from the same piece of material and may well have been joined at one time.

In 1999, Robert spoke at the Orkney Science Festival and one evening, after dinner with fellow-scientists, Karl Pribram and Andrej Detela, went together for a private viewing of the Scroll.

The Brethren of Lodge Kirkwall Kilwinning take excellent care of this ancient document. It is kept high on the west wall of the temple, protected from direct sunlight within the darkness of the temple and access to it guarded from casual visitors, except by prior appointment.

Robert is a Mason but the Brethren of Kirkwall Kilwinning very kindly extended an invitation to the eminent visiting scientists, Prof. Pribram and Dr. Detela, to view their well-preserved treasures. Senior Members of the Lodge carefully unrolled the scroll and it was clear from its even colouring that the Freemasons of Kirkwall have taken good care of the scroll over the years. It shows no signs of fading and the linen is as strong as the day the Lodge received it into its care.

All three scientists were extremely impressed with the quality and preservation of the scroll and extremely grateful to the Brethren and Officers of the Lodge for allowing them to see the scroll. They all signed the Visitor's Book of the Lodge, noting that it is self-evident to anybody allowed to view the scroll that many generations of Orkney Freemasons have been faithful and careful custodians of this document since it was given to their Lodge in circa 1785.

The Lodge Book itself asks the question; "Was this the Kirkwall Scroll?" and then, by implication rather than proof, goes on as if it was.

Not all the Brethren believe this to be the case.

The Lodge Minutes for 27 December 1785 record: "Bro. William Graeme, visiting Brother from Lodge No. 128 Ancient Constitution of England [Lodge Prince Edwin, in Bury East Lancs] was, at his own desire, admitted to become a Member of this Lodge, and he accordingly signed the articles and Rules thereof."

Seven months later the minute book records that Bro. William Graeme gifted to the Lodge a floor cloth. This is believed to be the Kirkwall Scroll. Its history before this time is not known.

Bro. Graeme was an Orcadian by birth who spent many years living in the North of England.

In a lecture on the history of the Kirkwall Scroll, given to Lodge Kirkwall Kilwinning in 1976 by Bro James Flett, he said: "When I joined our Lodge many years ago there was at that time a very old Brother who occasionally visited the Lodge meetings at the advanced age of over 90. On one occasion I asked him if he could tell me anything about the Scroll. He said he did not know very much about it except that, at his Initiation, it lay on the centre of the Lodge room floor when he was a young lad of 20."

There is some doubt about this story, however, as some senior Members of the Lodge say that the older Lodge Room where they met prior to moving to their present premises was too small to allow the scroll to be used as floor cloth. "It would have more than filled the floor space and left no room for the ceremony."

One venerable Mason said, "The implication by the old Brother of 90, an occasional visitor to the Lodge, is equally suspect. He was 90, it was seventy years since his Initiation. Could his memory be slightly at fault? Yes, the argument could be put the other way, I agree. But I think it's too tenuous for outright proof. An early Tracing Board is what I believe it may have been. A 'navigation chart' to use the phrase of the non-Masonic Knight Templars which would have been unrolled to the relevant Degree being worked. The Scroll is too long for the floor area of the existing T

Writer, Andrew Sinclair, claims that the little-known Kirkwall Scroll is second in value only to the famous 13th Century Mappa Mundi that hangs in Hereford Cathedral. "It's beyond price" says Sinclair, who heard about the scroll while researching the history of the St. Clair Earls of Orkney "Its significance is immense. This will demand the rewriting of Scots medieval history." He claims that radiocarbon dating of the scroll points to the huge 18-foot sailcloth hanging as being 15th Century.

The St. Clair Earls of Orkney were strongly associated with the legendary Templar Knights, and the family stronghold in Midolthian is the site of Rosslyn Chapel, built by Orkney Earl, William St. Clair, in the fifteenth Century. The chapel is well known for its Masonic connections and symbolic carvings and was built in memory of the Earl's grandfather, William de St. Clair, who, legend has it, formed a secret order to protect the Templars a century earlier. Scottish speculative Freemasonry was associated with its symbolism and is believed by many to have originated from there.

"The operative side of the craft, connected with the trade guilds and stone masons, was also strongly associated with the St Clairs", says Rosslyn Chapel's Exhibition Director, Bob Brydon, "so there's little doubt that the Kirkwall Scroll has very significant implications."

"It's quite feasible it's a copy of an earlier document' he adds "and when things are copied the style of the era is usually very noticeable."

Although the Kirkwall Lodge's own archive material records the gift of a symbolic floorcloth in the 18th Century by a William Graeme, Lodge Members disagree about whether this was the Kirkwall Scroll.

Contact with the University of Oxford Research laboratory which did the radio-carbon dating adds to the mystery by supporting the dates. "We analyzed material from the Kirkwall Scroll on two separate occasions" says a spokesman from the Archaeology and History of Art department which carried out the work. "You have to allow a certain margi

But Sinclair is adamant.

"This knowledge was stored in the Scriptorium at Rosslyn Castle, and it included priceless Templar artefacts relating to the Holy Grail. I believe the Kirkwall Scroll is a unique treasure map taken to Orkney for safekeeping by Earl William after a fire which destroyed much of the original library."

The date of the fire has been confirmed by Judy Fiskin, former curator of Rosslyn Chapel, who now works for the National Trust. "It was documented as being at the time when William was Earl of Orkney and is guite provable" she says and agrees that priceless documents were stored at Rosslyn. "William St. Clair was one of the great illuminati of the time and I have been told from reputable sources that such people were also Master Masons."

Members of Lodge Kirkwall Kilwinning also have, in their records, information that the Orkney Earl, who owned Kirkwall Castle, where the present Lodge building now stands, held the appointment of "Patron of the Masons of Scotland" in the mid-15th Century. "We don't discount the possibility that something could have been stored in Kirkwall Castle, though there is no evidence to support it. What does bother us is the adverse publicity these kinds of claims will stir up" says a former Office Bearer.

And the statement by Andrew Sinclair that the priceless scroll should be removed for safekeeping has incensed them. "Anything is priceless if you've got a market for it so his sensation-making claims of it being worth millions mean nothing. It is priceless to us, and we have safeguarded it well for more than two and a half centuries. No one can have access without special permission, and it is protected from the light, so we would urge 'leave well alone'."

What is not in doubt is that the Kirkwall Scroll has been in the care of the Lodge for a very long time. The symbols up the centre strip seem to show the means of progression of the Initiate from the Degree of Entered Apprentice through to the rank of Sovereign Grand Inspector General.

The scroll as it is presently displayed could be used as a Tracing Board for the Degrees Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite by simply unrolling the relevant section for each Degree. Many of inscriptions on the scroll are written in a Masonic code, which forms part of the Secrets of the Thirteenth Degree of Master of the Ninth Arch, or The Royal Arch of Enoch.

This Masonic Cypher is known as the Enochian Alphabet. On the second tabloid upwards, an altar is shown standing on a black and white pavement. On the pavement lies the triangular apron of a Deputy Grand Master of the Lodge of Perfection. The part of the inscription on the Altar reads: "I AM hath sent me unto you. I AM THAT I AM. I am the Rose of Sharon and the Lily of the Valley. I AM that I AM or I WILL BE that I WILL BE."

This is a clear reference to the 18th Degree of the A&A known as Knight of the Rose Croix.

On the two tabloids higher there is a diagram of the Lodge layout for the reception of a Grand Inspector Inquisitor General, modeled on the description of Solomon's Temple found in the Bible. The Lodge describes the scroll as "Our first treasure of antiquity," and long may the Lodge continue to keep this fascinating document in its careful and loving care.

The early dating of the centre portion of the scroll, which describes symbolically the route through the many Degrees of the Ancient Scottish Rite, adds to the evidence that Speculative Freemasonry started in Scotland around the mid-fifteenth century. The use of the Enochian Cypher is also interesting and may well reveal more in due course.

It is entirely appropriate that such an important Masonic artifact should remain in the excellent care of one of Scotland's oldest Lodges.

After all, Lodge Kirkwall Kilwinning holds a Warrant, signed by William St Clair, direct descendant of the last St. Clair, Earl of Orkney, and the scroll is housed alongside it.







This Body confers the Degrees from 4th to 14th. They exemplify the legend of the Master Mason Degree and the story of the building of King Solomon's Temple. These Degrees are designed to build on the teachings of the first Three Degrees given in the Craft Lodge. Unlike the Craft Lodge, Candidates are not required to do memory work

in any of the Scottish Rite Degrees.

Upon completion of the 14th degree, the new Scottish Rite member is entitled to wear the distinguished Scottish Rite ring that has retained its design for over 200 years. An inscription inside the ring reads: "Virtus Junxit Mors Non Separabit" that is to say, "Virtue has joined, death shall not separate", or "Whom virtue unites, death will not separate".

Chapter Rose Croix

After completion of the 14th Degree, the Masonic educational journey continues with the Degrees of the Rose Croix. The 15th and 16th Degrees related to the rebuilding of the Second Temple by Zerubbabel. The Second Temple Degrees portray the never-ending struggle against the adversaries of Truth and Light: a struggle that is still going on today. In these Degrees important moral and spiritual precepts of value to Masons of all ages are proclaimed.

The 17th Degree is an approach to, and the 18th Degree a recognition of, the religious ethics in universal terms: thus assisting in the building in our hearts of the Third Temple not made with hands. The 18th Degree culminates with the Degree of the Knight Rose Croix.





In the September 2024 issue of *The Beacon: Lighting the Way !!!* newsletter, W. Bro. Warren Northcott, Member of Otonabee Lodge A.F. & A.M. No. 101 G.R.C., and former W. Master of Royal Arthur Lodge No. 523, shared with us an article about his guard dog, Tolstoy, the article stating:

HOW EVEN THE DOGS AMONGST US CAN DRESS UP

The story of Tolstoy getting his apron is a tribute to conversations among Masons and what they can contribute to making a wish or initiative happen.

From the start of mentioning to V.W. Peter Rhodes that my guide dog, Tolstoy, needed a dog-sized apron, a feel-good mission began.

Peter didn't know what to do with his father's apron in its deteriorated form and found a purpose or wish that gave it more meaning or significance than he could have anticipated.

My Dad was a Mason for 36 years before he Passed to the Grand Lodge Above on 07th June 2005.

He was Initiated in Tates Hall Lodge No. 7645 in Pontefract, Yorkshire, England, on 16th May 1969. After receiving his Master Mason Degree, he served as Secretary until he emigrated to Canada in May 1975. He joined Galt Lodge No. 257 and became Master in 1985 and also served as Secretary. He later became a Royal Arch Mason.

The last time he attended Lodge was September 19, 2001, when I was Raised to the Third Degree. I drove him back home to Cambridge the next night. It was raining. When he got out of the car, his apron case fell into the gutter, which was flowing with water. I told him to make sure he removed his apron to dry it out. He said he would but, since he was showing initial signs of dementia, I called him when I got home to remind him to dry out the apron. He said he would. After he had died, I had the difficult job of clearing out his apartment of all his belongings. I found his apron case and, when I opened it, I found it was full of black mold and the apron was ruined. I knew I had to burn it but was reluctant to do so. Then, when we thought Tolstoy should have an apron, it occurred to me, we could use all the bling on the apron, which could be sterilized, so I removed it and gave it to Warren. I burned the case and the rest of the apron. My dad loved dogs and I am sure he is happy that some of his apron has gone to a good cause."





Brethren,

Yes, only one official prompter is required. If you have been asked to do a part of the Ritual, please prastice it, memorize it and do the correct floor work. If you have been asked to be the Installing Master, take the time needed to learn the Ceremony. An Installing Master should be asked to conduct this important Ceremony at least a year ahead. There should be plenty of time to learn how to install the new Worshipful Master and the Officers. If you have been asked to do a part in a Degree, please put in the time to do it correctly. As long as you have tried your best to commit that piece to memory, there is no shame in asking the prompter for a word.

I have seen open books and tablets used and I am not a fan of that. Reading the Ritual out of an open book or from an electronic device only waters down the Lodge meeting, but it doesn't help the Members connect to the lectures and ceremonies. We need to do better. In fact, I have asked the District Deputy Grand Masters to let the Lodges know that more than one open book for prompting in a Lodge meeting is unacceptable. I understand if the Lodge Secretary is too busy recording the minutes of the meeting to be the official prompter, one Member can still be appointed as such, to prompt. Only one prompter with only one open book of the Ritual is required.

R.E.M. is the vision of our Grand Lodge, Ritual, Education and Mentoring. Ritual is the part of that vision that we can do better on if we commit ourselves to more practices, education and mentoring. Better Ritual means being better prepared for the Lecture and/or Ceremonies ahead of time; open Ritual books in the Lodge room are not permitted other than the one for the official prompter. What is the significance of the Northeast Corner?

Cornerstones are laid in the Northeast corner.

Entered Apprentices stand in the Northeast corner of the Lodge. The point midway between the darkness of the North

and the brilliance of the East was chosen by ancient builders as the point of beginning - a spot to mark a birth - the commencement of a new structure.

Obviously, he who stands in the darkness has no light; as obviously, he on whom falls the whole light of the brilliant East and its rising sun is not in darkness.

The point halfway between then, is a symbol of a beginning - the traveller has left the darkness and moved toward the light. Those who build have left the "darkness" in which there is no building, and progressed far enough towards the "light" to lay a foundation stone: - a place that, by its position, symbolizes movement away from blackness into the day.

The symbolism of the Northeast corner

in the Entered Apprentice Degree is taken from this ancient practice of laying the cornerstone in the Northeast corner.

He who stands there in the Lodge, "a just and upright Mason,"

is himself a cornerstone of the Lodge which will be.

A Lodge is erected, not only by, but upon, her sons.

The Entered Apprentice of today is the veteran Mason and Lodge Member of tomorrow.








FROM THE GRAND ARCHIVES: AN ONTARIO MOON LODGE

by V.W. Bro. Greg McKinnon, Grand Archivist





This month's submission offers a glimpse into a particular Masonic practice of the early nineteenth to the early twentieth century. The practice of Lodge meetings being held on or near the full moon. These "moon Lodges" have been a part of modern Masonic lore for a number of reasons - practical, astrological, and esoteric in nature - and offers perhaps a romanticized look at a bygone phenomenon.

Found on the inside left page of the Collingwood Masonic Directory for 1876, you can see that Manito Lodge No. 90 GRC had "Regular Meetings on the Wednesday on or after Full Moon Full Moon in every month".

Many have suggested that moon Lodges had an esoteric reason for meeting during this regular astronomical occurrence. This may be true, but perhaps the most important and practical reason was for light. Not the metaphysical light often associated with our Craft, but physical light and the assistance that it provides in way-finding - particularly in rural Ontario at that time.

Another possibility is that, since Lodges date back to the early 18th century, the moon was a very convenient timekeeping method that everyone had access to.

As M.W. Bro. Raymond S. Daniels pointed out in a 2006 presentation, "There is a vestige of this tradition still to be found in Section 382 of the Book of Constitution: 'No higher degree in Masonry shall be conferred on any Brother at a shorter interval than four weeks from the date of receiving a previous Degree, except under dispensation from the Grand Master.' Four weeks, or twenty-eight days is the lunar month."

M.W. Bro. Raymond S. Daniels goes on to say, "If one examines the recorded history of our early Lodges, invariably the regular meeting will held on a certain day 'on or before the full moon' holding thirteen meetings during the year. In the late eighteenth and early nineteenth centuries, when the population in Upper Canada was mainly rural, the natural illumination provided by the full moon guided members over rough country roads on their way to and from Lodge."

He discusses some of the more esoteric influences in this way:
"The moon is a symbol of life-rhythms, an ever-recurring cycle
perpetually returning to its beginning, of periodical change, a cosmic image
of growth and renewal, of resurrection and immortality – the cyclical nature
of all things. The universal measuring gauge, its successive and regular phases,
measure passing time and were the basis of the first known calendars.
As the moon has no light of its own, but reflects the light of the sun,
it is seen by philosophers to be a symbol of knowledge acquired
through reflection – theoretical, conceptual, and rational. As such,
it is a meaningful symbol for speculative Freemasonry."

Or perhaps it was simply practicality that created the need for the moon Lodges. There is certainly truth to the fact that roads were poorly lit and likely treacherous for various reasons in rural Ontario at this time. And, with the advent of better roads, artificial lighting, and eventually automobiles, the necessity of meeting during the full moon diminished. By the early 20th century, most Lodges in Ontario had abandoned the practice. However, some Lodges retained the tradition as a nod to their heritage, meeting during the full moon out of respect for the past.

Editor's Note:

My mother Lodge, Keene A.F. & A.M. No. 374 G.R.C., was Instituted on 31 January 1879 in the Village of Keene, Ontario, meeting on the third floor of an emporium or general store, located on the north-east corner of the junction of Water and North Streets in the Village of Keene. The building was owned by James McNeil, one of the first two Candidates of the Lodge, and his partner, Tom Campbell, a Charter Member of Keene Lodge.






By this time the village of Keene had been settled for fifty-four years, having been established in 1825.

The emporium had an interesting location in that the Lodge members could enter their third floor Lodge rooms from the ground level due to the fact that the three-storey structure had been built into a steep bank.

Lodge night in Keene always occurred on the third Thursday of the month as that was the closest date to the full moon. Before the advent of automobiles, Masons would travel from their homes to the Lodge meeting by the full moon of the month as it was easier for their horses to find their way home after a full night of Masonic fellowship.



REFLECTIONS OF A GRUMPY OLD PERSON

Checking out at the store, the young cashier suggested to the older woman that she should bring her own shopping bags because plastic bags weren't good for the environment.



The woman apologized and explained, "We didn't have this green thing back in my earlier days"

The cashier responded, "That's our problem today. Your generation did not care enough to save our environment for future generations."

She was right — our generation didn't have the green thing in its day.

Back then, we returned milk bottles, pop bottles and beer bottles to the store. The store sent them

back to the plant to be washed and sterilized and refilled, so it could use the same bottles over and over. So they really were recycled.

We refilled writing pens with ink instead of buying a new pen, and we replaced the razor blades in a razor instead of throwing away the whole razor just because the blade got dull.

But we didn't have the green thing back in our day.

We walked up stairs, because we didn't have an escalator in every shop and office building. We walked to the grocery store and didn't climb into a 300-horsepower machine every time we had to go two blocks.

But she was right. We didn't have the green thing in our day.

Back then, we washed the baby's diapers because we didn't have the throw-away kind. We dried clothes on a line, not in an energy-gobbling machine burning up 220 volts — wind and solar power really did dry our clothes back in our early days. Kids got hand-me-down clothes from their brothers or sisters, not always brand-new clothing.

But that young lady is right. We didn't have the green thing back in our day. Back then, we had one TV or radio in the house — not a TV in every room. And the TV had a small screen the size of a handkerchief — remember them? — not a screen the size of the county.

In the kitchen, we blended and stirred by hand because we didn't have electric machines to do everything for us. When we packaged a fragile item to send in the post, we used wadded up old newspapers to cushion it, not Styrofoam or plastic bubble wrap.

Back then, we didn't fire up an engine and burn gasoline just to cut the lawn. We used a push mower that ran on human power. We exercised by working so we didn't need to go to a health club to run on treadmills that operate on electricity.

But she's right. We didn't have the green thing back then.

We drank water from a fountain or a tap when we were thirsty instead of demanding a plastic bottle flown in from another country. We accepted that a lot of food was seasonal and didn't expect it to be flown in from other parts of the world thousands of kilometers away.

We actually cooked food that didn't come out of a packet, tin or plastic wrap and we could even wash our own vegetables and chop our own salad.

But we didn't have the green thing back then.

Back then, people took the streetcar or a bus, and kids rode their bikes to school or walked instead of turning their mothers into a 24-hour taxi service.





Bro. Patrick Steeves, the new Treasurer of Peterborough Lodge A.F. & A.M. No. 155 G.R.C., climbed Mount Kilimanjaro in August 2024 alongside Team Fox, for the Michael J. Fox Foundation for Parkinson's Disease (PD) Research. This climb helped to raise critical funds for continued research to help those inflicted with PD.

Here's his article about his spectacular climb:

"Spent our first days in Moshi, Tanzania, touring the local market on foot with a local guide and taking a cultural trip to a Chagga indigenous camp, touring the underground cave system, and were able to pick, roast, grind and make our own coffee to enjoy with lunch.



For the climb, we took
the Lemosho route
of the mountain,
which is the eight-day
Acclimatization route,
allowing climbers more success
by giving more time to acclimate
to the altitude, upon arrival
at approximately 2,000 feet
to the top of the mountain
at over 19,000 feet.

Typical mornings began at 5:30 a.m. with coffee/tea brought to your tent. Hot water arrived shortly after for washing up

and you had to pack for the day, eat breakfast, and be ready to march by 6:30 a.m..

Lunch was usually set up for 1:00 p.m. o'clock, more climbing, then stopping by 4:00 p.m. for a rest, dinner and an early bedtime, typically by 8:30 p.m..

Night skies are amazing with very clear, bright stars and no light pollution. We encountered huge variability in the terrain from hour to hour and day to day with rock, sand, gravel, ash, and boulders and a few streams. Climbing up rock faces, leaping over washouts, stepping over streams and sliding in mud.

I found the second day to be the most strenuous of all of the days, not only the terrain to deal with but the temperature variability over the day, starting in rainforest, then baking in sun on rock faces.

The never-ending false summits are mind-crushing as you really cannot sense when the trail ends. You just keep climbing higher and higher through rocky switchbacks.

The summit night began at 11:00 p.m. on August 15th. We were walking in the dark with headlamps only, on narrow cliffs and steep rock faces to arrive at Stella Point in time for the sunrise.

The entire group climbed another hour to the summit, arriving at 7:50 a.m. on August 16, 2024.

After approximately 20 minutes at the top, the descent was quick, back to the base camp in approximately three hours, sliding down ash, scree and very loose surface materials.

After a lunch and packing one's gear, the group continued walking for 4 hours to get to a safe altitude and spend the last night on the mountain.

This day was the most grueling for many and one member of the group was airlifted by helicopter down the remainder of the mountain to rest up and meet us at the gate the following day.

The tour company had a celebration outside of the gate with traditional foods plus pizza, Kilimanjaro Beer and local wine.

After two nights of rest back at the hotel, some of the group headed back to the States

and I headed off on a four-day safari through the Serengeti, Lakey Manyara, the Ngorongoro Crater and Ngorongoro Conservation Area.







The wildlife was phenomenal, seeing most everything, with the exception of rhinos.



31 hours of airports, flights and roadways to get back home by 1:00 a.m. on Saturday, August 24th.

Certainly a trip of a lifetime, taking me outside of my comfort zone.



We did it! All eight members of Team Fox summited at 7:50 a.m. on August 16th.

The group fundraising is currently at approximately \$98,000 CAD and still climbing.

My personal fundraising has been approximately \$14,000 CAD, thanks to many of you.

Parkinson's disease (PD), or simply Parkinson's, is a neurodegenerative disease of mainly the central nervous system that affects both the motor and non-motor systems of the body. The symptoms usually emerge slowly, and, as the disease progresses, non-motor symptoms become more common. Usual symptoms include tremors, slowness of movement, rigidity,

and difficulty with balance, collectively known as parkinsonism.

Parkinson's disease dementia, falls and neuropsychiatric problems such as sleep abnormalities, psychosis, mood swings, or behavioral changes may also arise in advanced stages.

Diagnosis is mainly based on signs and symptoms, usually motor-related, found via neurological examination, though medical imaging like neuromelanin MRI can support the diagnosis. Usual onset is in people over 60 years of age, of whom about one percent are affected. In those younger than 50, it is termed "early-onset PD".

No cure is known: treatment aims to mitigate symptoms. Initial treatment typically includes L-DOPA, MAO-B inhibitors, or dopamine agonists.

As the disease progresses, these medications become less effective and produce a side effect marked by involuntary muscle movements.

Diet and certain forms of rehabilitation have shown some effectiveness at improving symptoms. Deep brain stimulation has been used to reduce severe motor symptoms when drugs are ineffective.


There is little evidence for treatment of the non-movement-related symptoms, such as sleep disturbances and mood instability. The average life expectancy is near-normal.

Classification and terminology

Parkinson's disease (PD) is a neurodegenerative disease affecting both the central and peripheral nervous systems, characterized by the loss of dopamine-producing neurons in the substantia nigra region of the brain. [1] It is classified as a synucleinopathy due to the abnormal accumulation of the protein alpha-synuclein, which aggregates into Lewy bodies within affected neurons. [2]

The loss of dopamine-producing neurons in the substantia nigra initially presents as movement abnormalities, leading to Parkinson's further categorization as a movement disorder. [3]

THE ROLE OF THE GRAND TYLER

Brother Clark Wilson, Grand Tyler Immediate Past Master, St James's Operative Lodge No. 97

Warm and Fraternal greetings from Freemasons' Hall, 96 George Street, Edinburgh. On the 21st of July 2024, I will have spent a total of 20 years as the Grand Tyler for The Grand Lodge of Scotland. It is rather remarkable to think that, as a 30-year-old boy, I would be spending the next two decades working within such a wonderful and prestigious establishment in the beating heart of Scotland's beautiful capital city.

Prior to being employed by Grand Lodge, I assisted the previous Grand Tyler with his duties on a voluntary basis. This provided me with an in-depth working knowledge and understanding of the role of The Grand Tyler. When my predecessor made the decision to take retirement from the role, he strongly recommended that I apply for the position. My employment started at Freemasons' Hall on 21st July 2005 under Past Grand Secretary, Brother C. Martin McGibbon. I have since then served under a further three Grand Secretaries.

The office of Grand Tyler is one that cannot be communicated in its entirety within this article alone due to the unpredictable and varied duties it entails. However, I will endeavour to outline some of the main duties which I undertake regularly.

Firstly, it is necessary to understand that the role of the Grand Tyler is not merely a Masonic ceremonial office on the days of Grand Lodge Communications.

My duties as a full-time employee of The Grand Lodge of Scotland include some of the following: opening and closing Freemasons' Hall for the staff and general public; ensuring health and safety measures are adhered to at all times; assisting the several departments in Grand Lodge with anything they require; communicating with the public for hall enquires and events; stock-taking and manual handling of deliveries; organising events and catering; liaising with security and fire services to ensure the building is up to legislative standards; setting up and laying out the furnishings for Grand Lodge Regular Communications; and a whole host of other general maintenance and caretaking of the premises on a daily basis.

It makes me feel proud to be afforded the privilege of serving the Scottish Craft in this capacity and to work within such a magnificent building that is rich in both architecture and character. All the hard work and long hours spent maintaining Freemasons' Hall to the standards befitting such a beacon of our history and heritage is particularly rewarding when, on the days of the Regular Communications, I put on my morning suit and adorn the green and gold Regalia of the Grand Tyler.

I have been proud to serve The Grand Lodge of Scotland in this capacity for so long and will hopefully be afforded the opportunity to do so for many more years to come.



The ego is the centre of consciousness; the self is the centre of the total psyche, including both the conscious and the unconscious."

The reference goes on to say, "For Jung, there is constant interplay between the two. They are not separate but are two aspects of a single system. Individuation is the process of developing wholeness by integrating all the various parts of the psyche."

I do know that Freemasonry simultaneously chooses to subdue our egos and find our "self."

Perhaps one of the binary stars must be dominant, and in that dominance is where we find the traits of a person – arrogance or humility, graciousness or rudeness. In the balance between the stars, we find the nature of the gasses they put off. It is difficult to be



of service to your fellow Masons and at the same time be immodest and arrogant.

There's little room for others when you fill the room with your ego.

Perhaps that is also why we learn to subdue passions – the passions of the ego

and develop the passions of the self – the connection to the divine.

In the past, I wondered why we, as Freemasons, pin medals on our chests and put numbers at the end of our names, or added titles when we attain certain Masonic Degrees / Ranks.

I think this is another of those tests – do we do it for prestige?

Do we wear our outward jewels as a "brag rag," as I heard one Brother call it long ago? Or do we wear them to honour the Work we've completed and bring to the gathering?

Do we shine our Ego brightly to make our "Self" fade? Intent is everything and nothing; we must be clear about what the outward trappings mean in order not to fall into the trap itself, yes?

Is one Degree better than another? What have we really attained?





I think about these things often.

I do my best to remember the duty and cautiously regard the glitter. It seems to stick to everything.

Does Masonry feed the Ego? Or help one subdue it? Maybe it's an ongoing dialogue rather than a simple, solitary question.

EXERCISE FOR PEOPLE OVER 60

Begin by standing on a comfortable surface, where you have plenty of room at each side.

It's raining poppies at the National Uplift today at New Haig House. David Jarvis is an Invictus Games Gold medalist and also an Aberdeenshire Volunteer.

This week marked a key milestone in the 2024 Scottish Poppy Appeal as thousands of poppies were collected from Lady Haig's Poppy Factory for distribution across the nation.

David Jarvis and Gordon Michie make sure the trailer door is secure on the 1st batch of Poppies and Wreaths to make their way all around Scotland.





The poppies were seen on their way by Scottish sporting hero, David Jarvis, a veteran of the Royal Signals who rode his way to gold for Team UK in the cycling time trials at last year's Invictus Games in Germany.

Poppyscotland factory workers celebrate another successful uplift of Poppies and Wreaths from the factory.

Around 1.5 million iconic four-petalled Scottish poppies have been produced this year at Lady Haig's Poppy Factory, as the charity continues the transition to completely recyclable poppies. Poppyscotland also continues to reduce plastic use in wreaths and other Remembrance items, which are handmade in the Factory by disabled veterans.

LADY HAIG'S POPPY FACTORY



Lady Haig's Poppy Factory was founded in 1926 by Lady Haig, wife of the Field Marshal. Originally established within the grounds of Whitefoord House, the factory is now located on Warriston Road in Edinburgh.

The workforce started out small - "two workers, a pair of scissors and a piece of paper" - but expanded quickly to make the bulk of the poppies required for Scotland.

During the 30s, the factory enjoyed great prosperity. The workforce grew to 117 with a waiting list of 338 hoping to join them. Most worked in the factory but some worked in the shops - up to three in Edinburgh at various times for the sale of toys, lampshades, woven goods and other handicrafts.

There was also a travelling shop which drove all round Scotland.

The momentum continued into the Second World War but, with the coming of that conflict, production shifted to war goods such as gas mask holders, blackout blinds, identity card holders, wallets, and Red Cross collecting boxes. By the end of the war, the still 100-strong staff included a growing number of Second World War casualties.







Also introduced in this period - in 1955, to be precise - was the standard lapel poppy, almost identical to the one we use today.





Change and continuity

Updated systems mean the factory can meet current and future demand, producing three million poppies, 40,000 wreaths and thousands of other Remembrance items annually.

At the same time, the reliable 1926 machine used to cut the silk petals for some of our wreaths is still going strong.

MASONIC EDUCATION IS NOT RITUAL/FLOORWORK INSTRUCTION.

Masonic Instruction is learning the ritual, floor work, and everything else that relates to the work being performed within a tyled Lodge. It is also the teaching of those skills that will help develop Members' leadership and management abilities. It is part of member development that requires the instructor to be proficient in the skills of ritual and floor work.

While I have a great appreciation for our Ritualists and those who do excellent floor work, I am always amazed that some of these men have no desire to understand where the ritual or floor work came from and what it actually means.

Masonic Education is learning about the meanings behind the work being performed within a tyled Lodge space. It is a study of the philosophies of the world, the liberal arts and sciences, Masonic ritual, the sacred volumes of law from the various world religions, Masonic history, and esoterics. It is the nurturing of the Member's intellect, imagination, and spiritual growth. It is the key to understanding how to follow the instructions left on the trestleboard that guide us as we struggle to shape our rough ashlar into a perfect one in our personal quarries. It is part of Member development that can be undertaken alone, but it really should be done in a group setting, which is why it should be prioritized as a part of our meeting experience.

When done properly in a group setting, men will let their guard down. When this occurs, you see the actual working of brotherly love. You see men who might be polarized oppositely from each other in the outside world agree on something. Every member has a voice during Masonic education.

Because of this, it allows the exchange of differing ideas and concepts to flow freely. It is through Masonic education that our Membership develops their ability to think independently and philosophically and take the lessons taught by our kindred science and apply them in the outside world.

An educated Membership is a Membership who will ask questions, study the constitution and bylaws of that particular body, and demand change.

It is much easier to instruct the Membership how to memorize our rituals and mimic floor movements, what duties they should perform in each chair in the lodge room, and how they should manage the Lodge when they become the presiding Officer.

Change in Freemasonry doesn't happen overnight, it happens very slowly, but we'll get there eventually. It's just a matter of time.

We must have the patience and stay the course.

HOW DO FREEMASONS GREET EACH OTHER?

Freemasonry is not a secret society. These days, everyone knows everything about it. Freemasonry is all about self-improvement and brotherly love.

It is easy for a Freemason, mostly, to recognize you. Most Members don't hide in plain sight. They like to show that they are Freemasons. For example, they use Masonic symbols on their baseball bat, caps, t-shirts, gloves, et cetera. Furthermore, you can see some Masonic-related stickers on their neckties, book covers, and license plates.

All these small secret details let their Brothers from the other Lodges recognize them easily. Though it isn't required, some Freemasons do that on purpose to find and make connections with the Members of other Lodges.

Apart from this, there are some other things Freemasons do as well.

They make remarks and ask questions, such as:

How old is your grandmother? I see you have travelled to the east. Are you a travelling man?

How old is your grandmother?

This question is about your Lodge number, which should always be given in whole numbers.

I see you have travelled to the east:

For a Freemason, travelling to the East means "searching for knowledge", and travelling to the West means "propagate that knowledge".

You answer the question according to your status and goal in the Lodge.

Are you a travelling man?

If you are a Freemason, the answer should be "yes".

And if they ask where you are travelling from, you can say west to east or east to west.

At the conclusion of the 1937 Communication, William James Dunlop, Initiated in Peterborough No. 155, Affiliated with University No. 496, Toronto, was chosen as Grand Master.

In 1938, the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia celebrated the two hundredth anniversary of the organization of the first Masonic Lodge in Canadian soil. The many distinguished Masons from abroad who attended were invited to come to the Communication of the Grand Lodge of Canada as well. The response was overwhelming, and no fewer than thirty-one of them attended the meeting in Toronto, including deputations from all three Grand Lodges in the British Isles. Honorary rank in the Grand Lodge of Canada was conferred on twelve of the Visitors.




"I wouldn't say that." The New Mason flushed.


"My little girl graduated from the eighth grade into high school last week," answered the New Brother. "Why?"

their knowledge of the necessity for practising brotherhood in the Lodge?"

"They have no traditions to steady them. They have no matters of common knowledge to bind them together. They have no past of which to talk. All they possess is their mutual Masonry and their mutual responsibility - their hopes, their fears, their plans and their determination. An unwritten page is theirs on which to record their Masonic future. The Mystic Tie is all they know of Lodge life. The Grand Master pronounces them a Lodge, the Charter or Warrant is presented and they are born. To me it is a simple, beautiful, pathetic and interesting sight, and one I never tire of seeing."

"I am a fool." The New Mason spoke with conviction.

"Old Tiler, why did the Senior Deacon gather up the corn that was used and put it carefully away?"

"He couldn't gather the wine and the oil, since they were spilled for good," answered the Old Tiler. "But that little horn of corn will be kept until this new Lodge itself sponsors another new Lodge, then to be offered to them, that they may be consecrated with the same corn poured for the Mother Lodge."

"Oh, I am a fool, indeed," cried the New Mason. "Please take me with you to the next such ceremony, will you?"

The Old Tiler grunted. But it sounded like a promise.

Bro. Carl Harry Claudy (1879 - 1957) was an American author, magazine writer, and journalist for the *New York Herald*. His association with Freemasonry began in 1908, when, at the age of 29, he was Raised a Master Mason in Harmony Lodge No. 17 in Washington, D.C. He served as its Master in 1932

and eventually served as Grand Master of Masons in the District of Columbia in 1943.

If you can believe it... Bro. Carl Claudy wrote well over 400 of these *Old Tiler Talks* along with many other Masonic books and pieces ... a very dedicated Mason and man.

His Masonic writing career began in earnest when he became associated with the Masonic Services Association in 1923, serving as Associated Editor of its magazine, *The Master Mason*, until 1943.

THE VIRTUAL MASON

It is a long and colourful account that describes the history of the Masonic Order. Traced back centuries to the stone quarries and towering palisades of the temples and cathedrals of early Europe, operative masons crisscrossed the countryside to ply their trade at the pleasure of monarchs and Popes.

Conventional wisdom suggests that the operative art was the foundation for our speculative science.

As we deliberate upon the particulars of that quiet evolution, from the rough hands and worn leathern apron of the operative mason of the Renaissance Period, to the bright, glittering lambskin and white-gloved hands of today's speculative Mason, it is difficult to know precisely when, where or how one ended and the other began.

While wise men of the Craft ponder those details, a second more strident evolution is taking place that could pull the institution in an entirely unexpected direction. With the whole wired world at our fingertips, we have access to an interminable supply of online Masonic information that can satisfy the most ardent researcher. This deserves our attention simply because it can all be done without ever entering a lodge room or feeling the grip of a Brother's hand.

Enter the virtual Mason

For centuries the secrets of our Order have been communicated from Brother to Brother through rites performed in our temples. The lessons we learned we learned together, instilling in us the true meaning of brotherly love. Indeed, the most important aspect of the Masonic journey was that we never traveled alone. Although our mysteries can now be scrutinized by anyone with a computer and a connection, the information is without context and limited to the ideas of others who may or may not be trustworthy sources. Such research extinguishes any possibility for personal discovery, a principle upon which our institution is founded.

Operative masons toiled in the physical realm to build stone edifices. Speculative Masons labour in the intellectual realm to raise the inner man. The virtual realm — a torrent of digital information where knowledge and engagement are distinct constituents — offers Masonic data at the expense of the Masonic experience. The virtual Mason is in essence a Mason, though not in fact.

We must therefore endeavour to support our Brethren, teach what it means to be a Freemason, and work hard to maintain a positive environment in our lodge rooms. Should we fail, we risk losing Members who would rather seek comfort and convenience alone in front of a computer screen than share time with their Brethren at Lodge.







This illustration depicts the entry and progression of the fraternity.



- 3. The "Worshipful Master course"
- 4. The "District Secretary's course".

Any Brother looking to run for the office of D.D.G.M. or Grand Registrar is required to have in their possession a certificate of qualification from Grand Lodge. In July 2018 a constitutional change was approved by the membership, and Section 50 (b) now reads ... A candidate for office as District Deputy Grand Master or Grand Registrar must be in possession of a qualifying certificate as offered by our Grand Lodge, on or before June 15 of the year seeking office. (2018). A copy of the revised 2018 Book of Constitution is on the Grand Lodge website. It can be found under the Recent documents tab.

What this change means is that there are now two paths available to receive a qualifying certificate for this running for D.D.G.M. or Grand Registrar. One remains the Past Masters Course and the other is to participate in any number of the day-long enhanced D.D.G.M. Preparation workshops that are conducted around the jurisdiction.

For a Past Master that is looking to run for the Board of General Purposes, the certificate of qualification remains the same under Section 38 (b), and that is the "Past Master's Course" offered by the College of Freemasonry.
